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# PERMANENT DISQUALIFYING CRIMES FOR LICENSED ENTITIES

There are criminal convictions that permanently prohibit a person from being licensed or authorized to have unsupervised access to children or persons with developmental disabilities.

If you have ever been convicted of felony (a) child abuse and/or neglect, (b) spousal abuse, (c) crime against a child including child pornography, (d) crime involving violence (including rape, sexual assault, or homicide, but not other physical assault), or (e) any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would disqualify you from having unsupervised access to children or persons with developmental disabilities in home or facility. The list of crimes includes the following and any crimes added by the legislation in the future:

- *Aggravated murder (class A felony)*
- *Arson in the first degree (class A felony)*
- *Assault of a child in the first, second, or third degree (class A, B, C felonies)*
- *Child abuse or neglect (RCW 26.44.020)*
- *Child molestation in the first, second, or third degree (class A, B, C felonies)*
- *Child selling or child buying (class C felony)*
- *Controlled substance homicide (class B felony)*
- *Communication with a minor for immoral purposes (class C felony)*
- *Criminal abandonment of a dependent person (1<sup>st</sup> = class B felony)*
- *Criminal mistreatment in the first or second degree (class B, C felonies)*
- *Custodial assault (class C felony)*
- *Custodial interference in the first or second degree (class C, gross misdemeanor)*
- *Drive-by shooting (class B felony)*
- *Failure to register or failure to notify of address change, transient status, or name change (if original conviction was a felony sex offense); (JRA permanent disqualifying felony)*
- *Felony violation of a protection order, "no contact" order, or child abuse restraining order*
- *Homicide by abuse (class A felony)*
- *Homicide by watercraft*
- *Incest in the first or second degree (class B, C felonies)*
- *Indecent exposure felony*
- *Indecent liberties (class B felony)*
- *Kidnapping in the first or second degree (class A, B felonies)*
- *Manslaughter in the first or second degree (class A, B felonies)*
- *Murder in the first or second degree (class A, B felonies)*
- *Patronizing a juvenile prostitute (class C felony, patronizing a prostitute = gross misdemeanor)*

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- *Possession of material or dealing in depictions of a minor engaged in sexually explicit conduct (class C felony)*
- *Promoting prostitution in the first degree (class B felony, 2<sup>nd</sup> = gross misdemeanor)*
- *Public indecency, if toward a person under fourteen years of age (same as indecent exposure = class C felony)*
- *Rape in the first, second, or third degree (including the rape of a child); (class A, B, and C felonies)*
- *Reckless endangerment (gross misdemeanor)*
- *Robbery in the first or second degree (class A, B felonies)??*
- *Selling or distributing erotic material to a minor (class C felony)*
- *Sexual exploitation of a minor (class B felony)*
- *Sexual misconduct with a minor in the first or second degree (class C felony, gross misdemeanor)*
- *Sexual offender failure to register or failure to notify of address change, transient status, or name change (if the original conviction was a non felony sex offense) when the victim was in the custody or jurisdiction of JRA; (JRA permanent disqualifier, gross misdemeanor if original conviction is non-felony, 9A.44)*
- *Sexually violating human remains (class C felony)*
- *Unlawful imprisonment (class C felony)*
- *Vehicular assault (class B felony)*
- *Vehicular homicide, while under influence of drugs, or alcohol, or by the operation of a vehicle in a reckless manner (class A felony)*
- *Any class A felony, criminal solicitation of or criminal conspiracy to commit a class A felony*
- *Any felony committed against a minor.*
